She also provided tips on surgical management of primary and permanent teeth with an emphasis on instrumentation that facilitates tooth

On May 30, residents and faculty from the department participated in the North Carolina Society of Pediatrics' White Coat Wednesday--a state-level advocacy effort where participants meet with state legislators to discuss child health issues. The event began with a morning briefing about the issues and talking points followed by a series of meetings with key legislators. This year, the group attended a Senate Health Committee hearing and was introduced on the Senate floor during the scheduled session in the afternoon. Numerous legislators were visited including Representatives Pricey Harrison, Verla Insko, Bert Jones, Mary Ann Black, Jon Hardister and Senators Mike Woodard, Valerie Foushee and Gladys Robinson. Two private practicing dentists, pediatric dentistry faculty and pediatric dentistry residents attended representing the North Carolina Academy of Pediatric Dentistry.

Bryan (1979) and Renea Cobb of Greensboro have established a personal fund in the Dental Foundation of North Carolina to honor the Cobb name and legacy. The Cobbs stipulated that the fund's endowment proceeds be used to recognize excellence in academics, patient care, or research. Bryan noted "Renea and I wanted to take this step for two reasons; first, is that having been involved with department fund development for many years and having seen great progress in this endeavor, it was obvious that we were missing our mark. We needed to be funding graduate students as our top priority. Second, we wanted to show leadership that would encourage others to follow by creating their own fellowship funds. Our goal would be that each graduate student be awarded a fellowship equal in amount to their tuition. We believe that this is entirely possible."

The first to be chosen as a Cobb Fellow was **Beau Meyer (2017)**. The most recent recipient of the Cobb Fellowship was **Molly Tesch (2018)**. She performed at an exceptional level in all aspects of our residency program here at UNC. Molly just finished our program and has accepted a position in Pediatric Dentistry of Matthews joining Scott Goodman, Meg Lochary, Jason Sperati and Jeff Monaco.

News from the NCAPD

The Board of Directors of the North Carolina Academy of Pediatric Dentistry had a busy meeting in April and since have focused on two major initiatives: the first is the leadership's ongoing effort to advocate for increased Medicaid fees for the children of the state. fFruitful collaboration has been achieved with both the Directors of Dental Medicaid and the State Health rector both of whom support our ambitions but the final hurdle is the NCGA. The jury is still out, so stay-tuned!

A second pressing matter has been the drumbeat for revisions in the NC Statutes but as initially drafted have the potential to affect advertising in the dental profession. We presented a strong statement at the June 7, 2018, hearing of the NCSBDE on the subject (as did most of the other specialties) and there was a unanimity of opinion among presenting parties that the pro-posed revisions will likely lead to a lack of truth in advertising. In our case we envision these changes as having high potential to confuse and mislead the parents

of children we serve. As of this writing, we do not know what action the NCSBDE will take on this matter but we made a compelling argument against the proposed revisions.

The 2018 Annual meeting of the NCAPD will be held on Saturday, October 13 at the Courtyard Marriott on Raleigh Road (Highway 54), immediately adjacent to the Friday CE Center in Chapel Hill. Following the business meeting, under the leadership of President Julie Dimock of Wilmington, the NCAPD will again sponsor a CE Course in opioid training that meets the NCSBDE's requirement. This course will be free for all NCAPD members as a membership benefit.

When making your weekend plans, don't forget to include a full day of UNC sponsored continuing education at the Friday Center on Friday, October 12, with an evening reception to follow.




Erin Tilton: I remember that I couldn't wait to go get my teeth cleaned because I always went home with stickers!

Department Research Activities

Our 2017 first-year residents, **Amanda Allen**, **Jennifer Crisp** and **Morgan Hess**, are off to a great start. They have identified their research projects and committees, and have made substantial progress while balancing their busy second-semester residency schedules. They provided excellent updates during the school-wide first-year residents' research protocol presentations on April 6.

Amanda will be working on the "Development and evaluation of an educational prototype to promote early childhood oral health in clinical practice". Her research advisor is **Rocio Quinonez (2000)** and committee members are Kelly Ryoo (School of Education), **Siggi Saemundsson (1996)** and **Tim Wright**.

Jennifer will be researching the "Use of Select Non-Surgical Caries Management Techniques in Pediatric Patients Among North Carolina Dentists". Her research advisor is **Tim Wright**, and committee members are **Kimon Divaris (2011)** and Anne Sanders (Department of Dental Ecology).

Morgan will be working on "Building a business model to implement infant oral health in a general dental office: demonstrating a lost income potential." Her research advisor is **Siggi Saemundsson (1996)** and committee members are **Rocio Quinonez (2000)** and Brad Staats (Kenan-Flagler School of Business).

Our second year residents, Anne Baker (2019), Ivy Brisbin (2019) and Erin Tilton (2019) have been busy making progress in their research projects, preparing and fine-tuning IRB applications and research Protocols. They presented their research updates in the department research seminar series last August.

Anne is working with **Jessica Lee (2002)** and **Ray White** (Distinguished Professor of Oral and

Maxillofacial surgery) to conduct a randomized clinical trial investigating the efficacy of buffered local anesthetics. Of note, Anne received the prestigious Sunstar/AAPD Post-graduate Research Fellowship to conduct her research. This fellowship supports Innovative research by residents in pediatric dentistry and is sponsored by Sunstar Americas--*Congrats*, Anne!
